Dues Increase

Last month there was a ballot included in the newsletter for members to vote on increasing the dues.

Out of 46 ballots sent out to members 28 were returned. From those the vote went 26 yes for the increase and 2 no votes.

The increase will take effect for the 2005 calendar year. There is a provision for members to pay before September 1, 2004 and pay at the 2004 rate. Any payments after that time will be at the new rates.

This increase came about as a review of the club finances over the past two years. We have found that our single largest expense is the publication of the newsletters.

Printing cost per page on the newsletter is \$.16. So a newsletter of 6 pages is \$.96. Add thirty-seven cents for postage and the total cost is \$1.33/month. With dues set at \$1.25/month we had a shortfall. Now with dues set at \$1.50/month we will just be breaking even on the newsletter. Other activities will have to be self-funding.

- iv) Caravan from Grand Rapids to meet at Burger King at Broadmoor and 52^{nd} at 7:45 am. Caravan will leave for Hickory Corners at 8:00 am
- v) John will add a note to the newsletter to remind people to bring lawn chairs.
- vi) Awards: Clark's Corvair has exchanged gift certificates for advertising in our newsletter. These will be used as prizes. John will print certificates to be awarded to the winners of the following classes: Late Open, Late Closed, Early Open, Early Closed, FC (to include UltraVans).
- b) July meeting will be at Rosie's Diner in Rockford on July 21. Meeting will be at 7:30.
- c) By-laws review: Dues increase passed. John passed out copies of constitution and by-laws.

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CORSA International Convention

This year the CORSA International Convention took place in Lexington, Kentucky. I really wanted to go, but work got in the way so I got to stay home. It seems that our members went down and wanted to make sure that everyone remembered there was a club in West Michigan. For the most part that almost happened.

Let's start the odyssey with Ryan Counterman. Ryan had been working diligently on his V8 conversion to have it ready to take to the Corvair drag races on Monday, June 14. Ryan was close or so he thought.

The car was running and he had done a little road test on it the week before the convention. He found one problem. The rocker nuts seemed to be working loose and causing a little ticking in the engine. So some high-performace nuts were ordered. But there just wasn't enough time to get the car running when he found his cam had problems and had worn away a couple lobes. So the decision was made to trailer the car down and replace the cam once in Lexington.

In Lexington the engine was found to have a few more problems like the rocker studs were being pushed out of the heads. This was not going to be fixed for the drag races. So now what to do?




So how do you follow up that victory? By driving the truck back to the hotel and stripping the gears out of the differential turning a corner in the parking lot.

August is fast approaching and with it comes our Car Display during the Red Barn Spectacular. Plan to spend the day with the club.


The Gilmore Museum will be open to tour. The musuem has an impressive collection. One of the exhibits is the Shell gas station. This is reproduction of a 1930s era full service station. It is complete with old pumps and tools of the era.

Or you can learn about one of the all time classic cars, the Pierce Arrow. This is what the Gilmore web-site says: "Pierce-Arrow was once one of the most recognized and respected names in the automobile industry and for 38 years produced some of the finest luxury automobiles made. The Pierce-Arrow Motor Car Company of Buffalo, New York actually began as a manufacturer of birdcages, iceboxes and other household items following the Civil War. By 1896, they began producing bicycles, and within five years, had entered into the motorcycle and automotive fields and continued until 1938. The luxury automaker had a rich history—from its many automotive innovations, a strong racing legacy, and finally, to its merger with Studebaker in 1928."
