The Junkyard

I went to a junkyard for the first time in many years this past week. Our illustrious treasurer Doug Lectka paid a visit to Easy Russ' yard, on the north side of Grand Rapids, a few weeks ago in search of a 4-speed transmission. Doug knew that I was looking for a set of steelies for our '60, and he let me know that he'd noticed a '61 in the yard with what he believed were a set of the somewhat elusive '60-'61

wheels, with the little nubs that hold on the beauty rings that were only available those two years. I saddled up, and headed over. If you haven't been to Easy Russ', it's an experience. It's a family-owned business nestled in a neighborhood that's part residential, and part industrial. The cars are in a small yard out back, and most are covered by tall weeds. The folks running the place were very friendly, and led me on the search for my steelies. We found two wheels on the '61 Doug had referenced (it was, by now, missing the rear end, so we didn't get the other two), and two more on another early model out in the yard. All four wheels appear serviceable once they're sandblasted and painted (maybe powdercoated?).



This week's experience caused me to reflect on junkyards past. I don't know what wired my brain to love junkyards, but that's how it's always been. As a child, we would take trips from Chicago to Door County, Wisconsin to visit my grandparents at their summer cottage on Green Bay. Along the route, there was a small junkyard out in the country that we would go past. I would beg my parents to stop there every time we would pass it, so I could get out and look at the cars. This was the mid-70's, so there was lots of cool metal there. I remember everything from 30's era to the 60's in that yard. We would also take occasional trips to the county dump near my grandparents' place to drop off our garbage, and I remember finding hubcaps there from now-defunct marques like Packard and Studebaker. I wish I still had them—why would I have discarded those?

Fast-forward a few years, and I had high school friends with Volkswagen Beetles. We would frequent a junkyard in Antioch, Illinois, seeking VW parts. This particular yard catered to the vintage crowd, and I recall seeing a '60 Pontiac Catalina and a '59 Edsel along with all sorts of '50's through 70's iron. Move forward a couple more years, when I lived in southern California and owned a '59 Chevy. I can't describe how much cool stuff was in the desert yards out there. I'd venture to guess that most of the cars in SoCal junkyards in the 80's were cars that current-day collectors would take and restore, rather than junk.

My trip to Easy Russ' has reignited my passion for the junkyard. I snapped a few pictures of cars in their yard—when was the last time you saw a '62 Imperial in a junkyard?—got my wheels, and took them home. I'd like to make a return trip just to wander the yard. Not many modern-day junkyards carry vintage cars. Not in the Midwest, anyway. Maybe I need to plan a trip to the desert...
