WMCC History

Over the years, we have had various meeting places. Early on, we would meet at the homes of different club members. Once we became a larger group, we held our meetings at the Grand Rapids Public Museum (the old museum over on Jefferson). We met at the museum starting in 1974 until 1989. After that, the meeting spot moved to Kool Chevrolet. We eventually moved to a private room in the basement of Pizza Hut on 44th St. and Kalamazoo where we met until 1997. In 1998, we switched venues to a banquet room at Tommy Brann's. That lasted until 2013 when we decided we had enough of Brann's. Starting in 2014, we rotated our meeting places to various restaurants around the area. During the summer months, we would usually meet at a park, someone's home, or have special summer events that would take the place of the regular membership meetings.

When the club started in 1974, annual dues were \$6.00 per person. In 1989, dues were increased to \$8.00. Also in 1989, the club decided to have an additional \$5.00 surcharge for WMCC members who were not members of CORSA. However, it doesn't appear that was ever implemented as there was some additional discussion around it in 1992 but again, it doesn't appear to ever have been implemented. The thought was that the additional surcharge would supplement the fee the club has to pay to CORSA as non-CORSA members were getting CORSA benefits when the club held an event. Annual dues were increased to \$12.00 in 1993 and then to \$15.00 in 2002. Our current rate, \$18.00, was put in place in 2005.
