The second one was held in 2013 outside of Kalamazoo. There was some consideration of hosting another convention in 1992 but the idea was abandoned because the feeling was we couldn't get enough volunteers. We were also asked to assist the host club for another convention shortly after 2013 but we declined.


## 1986 - "A Grand Affair"




The 1986 CORSA International Convention, "A Grand Affair", took place on July 30 - August 2, 1986 in downtown Grand Rapids. The host hotel was the Amway Grand Plaza and the main car display took place on Calder Plaza. Yes, there were almost 200 Corvairs parked around "La Grande Vitesse" aka the Calder. Over 70 cars participated in the Autocross which was held at the Allendale campus of Grand Valley State College (as it was known then). It was estimated that over 350 Corvairs visited the city of Grand Rapids.

The club initially started internal discussions in December 1980 about hosting a convention. A formal presentation was made to CORSA at the 1981 convention that was held in Denver. Formal planning started in late 1983 and ramped up in 1984. The convention co-chairs were Cliff and Betsy Murphy. There was a lot of logistical planning, site visits by CORSA, and fundraising. One fundraiser was selling Corvair posters that showed the WMCC logo with a representation of each model of Corvair. There are actually still some of these posters available!

Below are some scans from the September 1986 *CORSA Communique* that recapped the convention. Also, there are some promotional pictures that were taken in 1982 of some Corvairs parked on Calder Plaza.





# 2013 - "A Vairiation in Kalamazoo"



The 2013 CORSA International Convention, "A Vairiation in Kalamazoo", was held on July 16 - 20, 2013 outside of Kalamazoo. We chose Kalamazoo over Grand Rapids so we could highlight the Gilmore Car Museum as a potential location for the Corvair Museum. The logo that was designed by Paul Adams' niece, Kristi Breisach, even included one of the barns at Gilmore Car Museum. There were 164 Corvairs at the car display that was held at Gilmore Car Museum. We also utilized the Kalamazoo Air Zoo for the Concours and

banquet as well as the U.S. 131 Motorsports Park for the Autocross (no, the dragstrip was not part of the Autocross course). The host hotel was the Four Points Sheraton.

The initial idea was for the club to host a mini convention in 2012. Then talks changed to host a regular convention in 2013. Dave Dykwell was elected chairman of the committee and a bid was formally made in September 2011. The Chicago club also submitted a bid but our bid package included some Two Hearted Ale from Bell's Brewery in Kalamazoo. I'm sure that is what sealed the deal for us.


