NIACE Remembers Richard N. Van De Velde

NJACE member Richard Van DeVelde died at his home in Rockaway Borough on Friday Jan. 4, 2008, with his family surrounding him. Richard was 81.

Richard was born in East Rutherford and was a longtime resident of Kinnelon with his wife of 61 years, Georgia. For the past three years they resided in Rockaway Borough. Many NJACE members will remember a visit to their Rockaway home and to Georgia's Stained Glass Works.

Even more members will recall Richard as one of our loyal "usual suspects," who could be counted on to attend virtually every club meeting and event for as long as his health allowed, most often with his 1961 Corvair coupe.

NJACE's February Parts Auction

February 16th brings one of the signature events of the year, the indoor Parts Auction on Saturday, February 16th, at Ashley's Auto Body in Flanders. This event is always well-attended, lots of fun and draws participants from several surrounding Corvair clubs. Come for the show, come for the excitement. Here are the details:

Corvair parts and related items are auctioned to the highest bidders, with a percentage of the sale price benfiting NJACE. You can buy, sell, do both or do neither. You can set a minimum acceptable bid for your parts, or no minimum bid at all. NJACE will collect a commission of 20% of the sale price for items up to \$50, 10% of the sale price for items over \$50. You may also donate items for the full benefit of the club.

All you need to bring is parts and/or cash, and a folding chair on which to sit. If you're selling, please organize your parts at home, using the Lot Cards that will be available at our Breakfast Meeting on February 2^{nd} . On the Lot Cards identify yourself, the parts, and a minimum bid. (If you put no minimum bid on an item the minimum accepted will be one dollar.) Then bring the parts and the Lot Cards the day of the auction.

On auction day there will be about an hour to set up your parts and tag them if you have not yet done so. If you don't want to be bothered tagging your parts and you just want to donate them to the club, just bring 'em and we'll handle everything.

Clean parts in good condition, parts that are less common, and new-old-stock parts always do well at these events. Leave the bent, rusty trim, greasy, broken junk parts and the broken manifolds at home. Also, we generally have more hub caps than buyers.

Buyers and sellers will each have numbers, our able assistants will record each transaction for settlement at the end of the auction and NJACE provides lunch (pizza and soda). But, the best part about the auction is a chance to get together with a great bunch of people. The auction is fast paced and a lot of fun. Our expert auctioneers will keep it moving and it is never dull. So come out on Saturday, the 16th by 9:00 AM for setup, and bidding starts at 11:00 AM. Bring parts! Bring cash! Bring a chair!

Directions to Ashley's Auto Body: From the east, west, and north: Take I-80 and exit at 27 onto Rte 206 south. Proceed about 3 miles south on Rte 206. At the 3rd traffic light, with the Old Mill Shoppe on the right, turn left onto Main St. In 1/10-mile bear left onto Hillside Ave, proceed 8/10-mile to Ashley's Auto Body, on the left.

From the south: Follow Rte 206 about 5 miles north of Rte 24 in Chester. At the traffic light just beyond "The After" road-side restaurant, turn right onto Main St. In 1/10-mile bear left onto Hillside Ave. Proceed 8/10-mile to Ashley's Auto Body, on the left. Lost? Call 973-584-7184.

The Last Corvair Home From Lime Rock

The NECC's Lime Rock event was in August. On December 28, the last Corvair arrived home.

In August, longtime NJACE member and NECC supporter Al Lacki drove his 1966 Monza coupe to Lime Rock from his home in Pennsylvania. On the evening before the track event, following the car show, Al and a friend drove over to Falls Village, to see the site of John Fitch's original shop. An easy, ten-minute ride on country roads. On the way back to the hotel, something went wrong with the engine.

Al limped the car back to the hotel, and limped it to the track the next morning. There, some basic exploratory surgery proved that it was not going to be something easy such as a broken rocker arm. The decision was made to trailer the car to Al Goldstone's shop, about 20 miles away. Brian O'Neill graciously left his race car sitting on the Lime Rock grounds at the end of the day and transported Al's car, returning to the track in darkness to collect his race car. I drove Al back to my home in New Jersey, then lent him my car to get home to Pennsylvania.

Al Goldstone tore down the engine, and found what is becoming more familiar in 110 engines: A dropped valve seat. Because the car is 41 years old and the engine had never been apart, Al Lacki ordered up a thorough rebuild. Al Goldstone completed that rebuild and on December 28 Al Lacki and I made the trip to Connecticut to retrieve the car.

We drove my '66 500 coupe to Connecticut, swapping it for the repaired car so that Al Goldstone could perform some elective work on my car. On our way back home we realized that the trip represented the last Corvair coming home from Lime Rock. 2007 marked the 35th and final NECC event at Lime Rock, and so Al's car, driven to the track in August for that event, was now being driven home from it.

While that realization rekindled the bittersweet memory of the NECC years at Lime Rock, the good news is that the rebuilt engine runs great! Only the crankcase and crankshaft were re-used. Bruce Carlton prepared new 110 heads, with mild porting and 140 exhaust tubes. A warm street cam was selected and parts came from familiar vendors far and wide. The result is the healthiest 110 I can recall experiencing. Al had a ball driving his reinvigorated car back home. I enjoyed spending a day on a Corvair road trip that used one Corvair going one way and a second Corvair going the other way. Lots of thumbs-up for both cars, and perhaps most gratifying, lots of interested stares from kids and teenagers, not just old folks who remember that Nader guy.

A day or two later, Al Lacki provided me with an update:

I thought you might also like a "tech" report on the rebuilt engine in my Corvair. So here it is: The engine now has roughly 300 miles under its (fan)belt. On our trip home from Connecticut to Pennsylvania, it ran very cool and registered a true 20 miles per gallon, (based on Google map miles, not odometer miles), despite being run up and down the RPM range throughout the trip. During most of the trip, our highway speed varied from 2,500 RPM to 3,500 RPM, with occasional blasts up to 4,500 RPM. It used about 3/4 of a quart of oil throughout the entire trip, about 260 miles; expected consumption for break-in. The engine doesn't ping under load and it starts easily, both hot and cold.

You may remember that that my Corvair is a '66 110 hp / 164 cid 4-speed stick. For the rebuild, I deliberately chose to stick with 110 heads with dual carbs instead of upgrading the engine to a 140x4 setup. The goal was to build up a cool-running, simple two-carb engine with a bit of extra power - something reliable that could travel long distances and yet have a bit of snarl.

It idles at 950 RPM, but it's not a peaky engine. It has very nice mid-range torque. It is WAY WAY faster than a stock 110! I'm a very happy customer!
